
## OSHA National Emphasis Program – COVID-19 Effective Date: <u>March 12, 2021</u>

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) issued a new direction, effective March 12, 2021. This new OSHA Direction, <u>DIR-</u> <u>2021-01 (CPL-03)</u> does four things:



## (1) describes policies and

procedures for implementing a National Emphasis Program (NEP) to protect employees in high-hazard industries from contracting SARS-CoV-2 (severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2), which is the cause of COVID-19;

(2) augments OSHA's efforts addressing un-programmed COVID-19-related activities (e.g., such as complaints);

(3) targets establishments with increased potential exposure to COVID-19; and

(4) adds focus to ensure workers are protected from retaliation.

**Note**: The OSHA Regional goal of this NEP is to continue performing a high percentage of COVID-19 inspections (at least 5 percent) of the Region's total assigned inspection goal.

This Direction is effective for 12 months, unless canceled or extended by a superseding directive. <u>Federal agencies are covered by this emphasis program</u>, provided the agencies are subject to inspection and have employees exposed to hazards covered in this NEP. The primary and secondary target industries are described in Appendices A and B.

Appendix A of the Direction lists primary target industries in healthcare (e.g., offices of physicians/dentists, ambulance services, general medical/surgical hospitals), and non-healthcare (e.g., grocery stores, discount department stores, general warehousing and storage, limited service restaurants, correctional institutions) by North American Industry Classification System (NAICS).

Appendix B lists secondary non-healthcare (e.g., construction of buildings, misc. manufacturing, school and employee bus transportation, postal service).
